Also, this November we will be having our sign-ups for winter sports. To qualify and continue to play for any team, students must have good attendance and good grades.


Early November, Ms. Armbruster and the cast will be presenting our fall dramatic production, *The Laramie Project*. I hope students and their families will come and support the students' performance.

Parent Teacher Conferences 12:00 - 3:00 PM




November 13th and 18th are half days for students. Students will be dismissed at 10:30 AM.



What Colleges look for in YOU!

Grades that represent strong effort and an upward trend. Grades should show an upward trend over the years. However, slightly lower grades in a rigorous program are preferred to all A's in less challenging coursework.

Passionate involvement in a few activities, demonstrating leadership and initiative. Depth, not breadth of experience is most important.

Work or out-of-school experiences that show responsibility, dedication, and development in areas of interest. A job or other meaningful use of free time can demonstrate maturity.

Letters of Recommendation from teachers and guidance counselors that give evidence of integrity, special skills, and positive character traits. Students should

request recommendations from teachers who they respect and have built special bonds with over the years.

Anything special that makes the student stand out from the rest



of the applicants. This includes honors, awards, evidence of unusual talent or experience, or anything else that makes the

student unique. Colleges are seeking students who will be active, contributing members of the student body.

Solid scores on standardized tests (SAT, ACT). These should be consistent with high-school performance.

Participate in some local Community Service that shows evidence of being a "contributor." Activities should demonstrate concern for other people and a global view.

A well-written essay that provides insight into the student's personality, values, goals is needed. The application essay should be thoughtful and highly personal. It should demonstrate careful and well-constructed writing.
